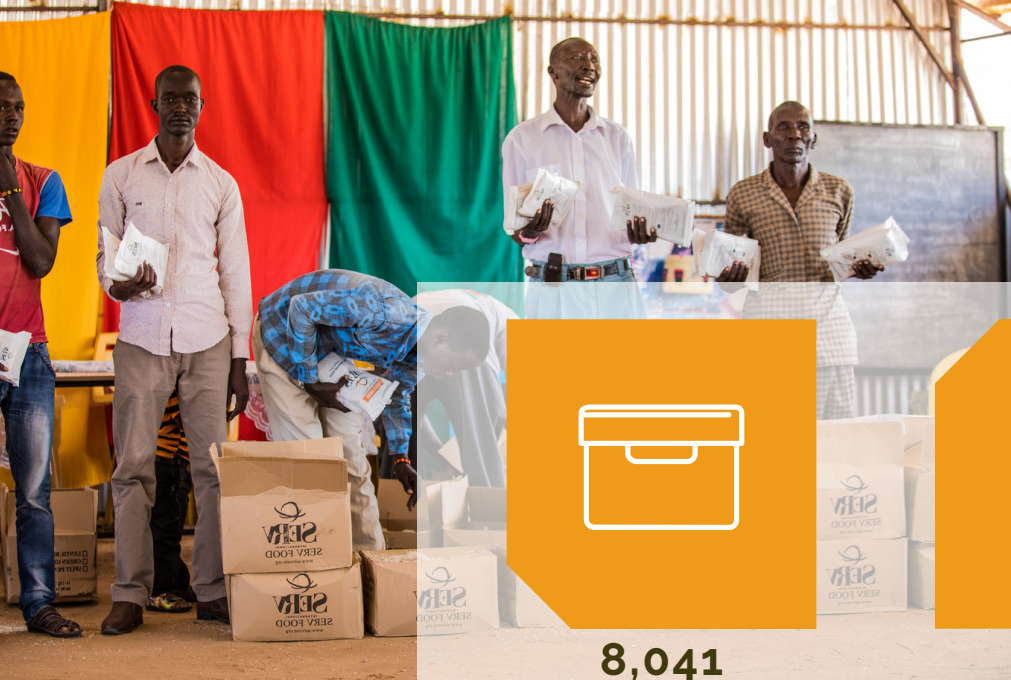

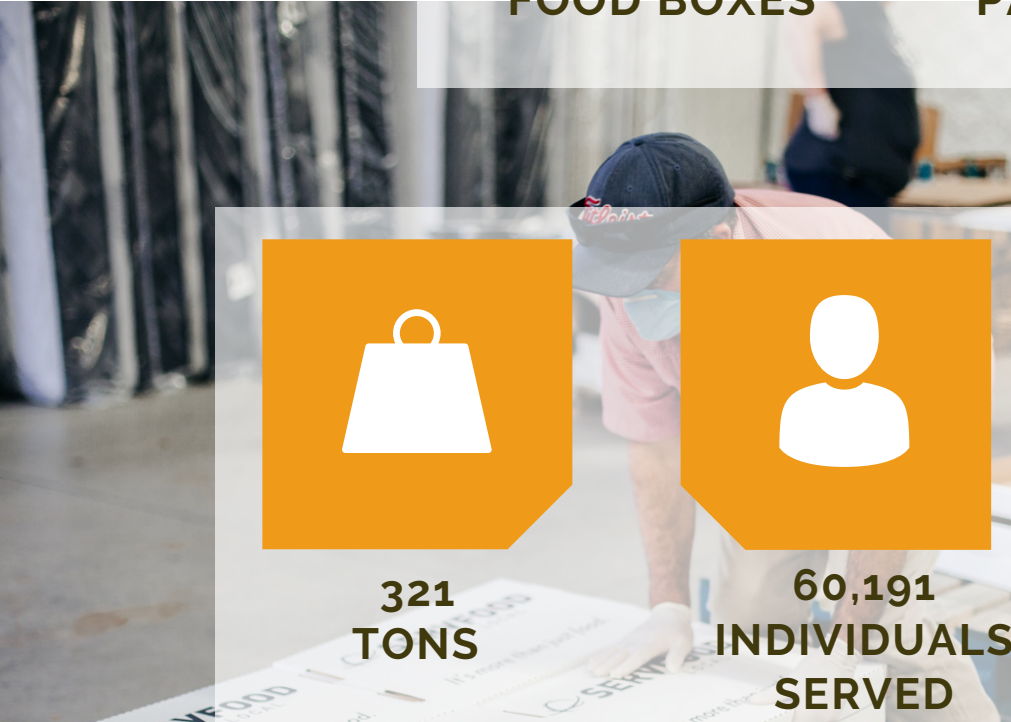

OUR RESPONSE TO COVID

Local USA

1. We designated 3000sq feet of our warehouse in Canton, Ga to be a donation drop off location for items requested by local schools and churches.
2. We worked with local churches to find safe ways to deliver resources to families affected financially by the shut downs.

International KENYA and CAMBODIA

1. We worked on logistics of producing SERV meals that will help families in areas that will have ZERO access to food.
2. We are worked with the local government of Kenya to create a rapid food respond unit.

Our staff in Atlanta, Kenya, and Cambodia followed all guidelines from CDC to make sure the communities we serve were not put at any risk and our team had gone above and beyond to make sure our Children at House of Hope Kenya and The Hope Center in Cambodia were under tight supervision from our staff and medical doctors on campus.

MEET REBECCA AKIRU

HOUSE OF HOPE ORPHAN STORY

Rebecca Akiru has been with SERV House of Hope since 2002. At the age of three, Rebecca was one of the first of 67 children who came to live at House of Hope. She is known for her quick smile, English fluency and generous spirit. Rebecca advocates for others. When new children arrive at House of Hope, she acts as a surrogate big sister and friend to let the children know everything will be okay.

Rebecca's father killed her mother the week after she was born and fled, leaving her all alone. Rebecca was raised by a neighbor Anna who she calls grandmother, a good woman who had very few resources. She had already lost three of her six biological children to illnesses. Anna tried her best to care for Rebecca -- they shared food when they had it and slept in the same dilapidated hut - - but it was easier to get alcohol than food in their village. Anna eventually fell into alcoholism. Effectively on her own, Rebecca performed chores for neighbors and fetched water in exchange for food. People would see her wandering alone searching for something to eat until one day Word eventually got to SERV founder Steve Kasha, who invited Rebecca to live at House of Hope. Anna, the grandmother, stopped drinking when she resolved that she wanted to see Rebecca grow up and succeed. Rebecca visits her on weekends and holidays and treasures memories of Anna's stories. Anna is so proud of Rebecca and how far she has already gotten in life.

Rebecca currently lives on the SERV property and has now transitioned childhood to adulthood as one of the SERV HOH Staff. She wants to give back to the Children at HOH and the Turkana Community. Rebecca during her growth has worked shifts in the HOH SERV store on premises, prepping and cooking meals, assisted with SERV Food pack-outs, worked with the Jewels of Obaga farming vegetables, assist with SERV mission teams, distributes food and witnessing to those in Kisumu slums, and the Turkana villages. Rebecca has been to the USA and was a speaker at Revolution Church, Women's Conference, Canton GA.

Rebecca a bright student with a promising future has accomplished a goal to graduate this year. She is one of the first of the House of Hope orphan children to finish high school, and the first person in her family to graduate high school.

Rebecca has a singular vision and purpose "To be successful in life, you have to work for it and be determined". Her goals are to continue her education. She was given a full scholarship from the Isagenix Foundation to fulfill her vision. Congratulations Rebecca!



LODWAR, KENYA



START House will be a transitional home for older kids who have aged out of House of Hope. Most of the teenagers staying here will go to college for a two year term. The building is still under construction, but we are hopeful that we will be open by July 2021. START House will open their doors to eleven teenagers.

When parents were furloughed during the pandemic, SERV was able to give 817 boxes to families around Cherokee County. Along with food, children received back to school backpacks and other goodies. This was a great way to engage and support families in our community.



SERV LOCAL

Orphaned from famine and civil war, South Sudanese children found themselves in Arua, Uganda where major organizations provided meals. As COVID forced borders into lockdown, these same organizations were left with a lack of man power and logistics to transport food. In a covert operation, SERV stepped in and transported a truckload of food from Nairobi, Kenya to the Uganda border. From hijacking threats to our truck being impounded, a team of three safely traveled over 80 miles to deliver 500,000 meals to Arua and Yumbe, Uganda.

Trying to pay off their debt, families in Pakistan have become bonded slaves to brick kilns. Men, women, and children work endless hours to earn trivial wages. Because of the thousands of meals provided by SERV, feeding their families is one less thing on their minds.
